On behalf of the people of Alabama, 12 individuals have filed information in the Fifteenth Judicial Circuit Court of Alabama charging State Senator Del Marsh with unauthorized exercise of authority.

The charge of unauthorized exercise of authority stems form Senator Marsh's efforts to revise the Alabama Constitution through Legislative efforts.


Legislative revision authority is denied by Sections 284 and 286 of the Alabama Constitution.

Three Alabama Supreme Court rulings acknowledge that only the people possess the authority to elect delegates to a convention wherein their constitution may be revised.

The Court will notify Senator Marsh via certified mail. Upon receipt Senator Marsh has 30 days to respond.

The 12 people bringing this controversy before the Court are ex rel.— that is to say that the controversy is brought in the name of the state. Therefore, a conflict of interest will likely occur if public funds are utilized to defend or provide legal advice for or to Sen. Marsh.
